New Children at Hope Home

Three new children have been brought to Hope Home by Social Services.

Gladness is five years old. She is an orphan who lived in a local village with her grandmother, until it became too difficult for the grandmother to care for her. Gladness will join Moshi Academy's Nursery class when the new school year begins in January. For the rest of this year she will be supported at the on-site daycare.

Eric and Angel are eight year old twins. They have had a very difficult start in life and it has now become impossible for them to stay with their stepmother. They

Emmanuel is beginning his final degree year at the prestigious Institute of Accountancy in Dar es Salaam.

Will is beginning his second year at the Institute of Social Work in Dar es Salaam.

John, Will's younger brother, is beginning his third year at the Mkolani Foundation in Mwanza. He is studying for an Ordinary Diploma in Clinical Medicine. This guarantees him a job as a lab technician.

Nancy, Wema's younger sister, is beginning her second year at Mzumbe University in Dar es Salaam, studying for a degree in Computer Science with Business.

Happy is beginning her second year at Mwenge University in Moshi, training to be a teacher.

Ibrahim is starting at Tasuba College, studying for a Diploma to qualify as a sound engineer.

So, how many children are there?

We can't give a straight answer.

There are 16 at primary school and one, Mirabelle, at day care.

Three of those have just finished primary school and will be moving up to secondary school in January.

There are eight children at secondary school.

We support a further two girls, Grace and Queen, who used to be at Kitaa. Social Services withdrew them to care for their sick grandmothers. We support them with school uniform and, in one case, food.

Six are in Higher Education. Plus Wema.

In addition to these 34, up to 40 children are directly supported by the on-site Day Care team.
